Let your Yes Be Yes!

"But above all, my brothers, do not swear either by heaven or by earth or by any other oath, but let your "yes" be yes and your "no" be no, so that you may not fall under condemnation." - James 5:12

"Oaths were allowed in Israel, but the person was required to fulfill them, especially because they so often involved invoking the name of God. James's prohibition of oaths builds on Jesus' prohibition in Matt. 5:33-37. And the point in both cases is that one's word should be enough." - ESV Study Bible

"Again, you have heard that it was said to those of old, "You shall not swear falsely, but shall perform to the Lord what you have sworn. But I say to you, do not take an oath at all, either by heaven, for it is the throne of God, or by the earth, for it is his footstool, or by Jerusalem, for it is the city of the great King. And do not take an oath by your head, for you cannot make one hair white or black. Let what you say be simply "Yes" or "No"; anything more than this comes from evil." - Matthew 5:33-37

"Jesus disciples are not to swear at all. Instead, their character should be of such integrity that their words can be believed without an oath." – ESV Study Bible

The above four paragraphs illustrate a process used when studying scripture and using a study Bible. The passage in James had a corresponding footnote on the bottom of the page which use a passage from Matthew to illustrate. This verse in Matthew then had a corresponding footnote of its own to help explain the corresponding verse. This process gives more insight and description to the original verse. This process has been used by the Men's Tuesday afternoon Bible study group. It helps to understand verses in context. Our study of verses often led us to research in commentaries, church history books or, as in this case, other verses. It makes for interesting and deeper study of the Bible in context. We have discovered that often the simple truth of a scripture verse is all we need. In this case we see that if we simply are people of our word, that life would be much better. Life lessons from parents or Sunday School to be truthful, honest, and fair pay life dividends. We see that in James or from the words of Jesus. I once heard a Christian high school football player say, "I just want to someday grow up to be a man of integrity. That's what I want!" We can all be people of integrity by listening to Jesus and to remember to let our "Yes" be yes and our "No" be no!
