Not so for all of us! An article I looked at on this subject used phrases like strength training, exercise regularly, high intensity interval training, etc. Oh my! 



# 2024 Desert Southwest

## **Annual Conference**

#### June 13-16, 2024 Making A Way

#### Isaiah 43:18-19;Jeremiah 29:4-7, 10-14

The Conference Plenary Session began Thursday with the Opening Worship including the Episcopal Address from Bishop Carlo A. Rapanut, where he mentioned how uncomfortable it is to be "dislocated...we are not where we used to be and not where we want to be" not only in the world, but also in the church. He drew us back to the passage from Isaiah 43: 18-19 where the Israelites were experiencing dislocation in Babylon. He challenged us to live into the fullness of life that God offers us. Stating we are in exile from the abundant life Jesus offered and need to engage in the hard work of healing, beginning by becoming healthy individuals that lead to healthy churches which lead to a healthy world. He committed to lead the beginning of this process. He asked, "Can we commit to being a healthy church that is working towards a healthy world by the time we turn 50?"

During the Laity Session, Alberta Farnsworth was re-elected as DSC Lay Leader for the next four years. Following this we heard informational presentations by Christy Lee of TMM, a ministry in the southern portions of the state that provides affordable housing for single moms, seniors, and veterans; and "Our Story" by Samuel Fayuant about the history and traditions of the Tohono O'odham.

After lunch, the clergy rejoined the laity for the Plenary session. All recommendations from the Council on Finance and Administration, the Conference Board of Pension and Health Benefits, and the Conference Personnel Committee passed as a group on the Consent Calendar.

On Friday, we continued to vote on the remaining rule changes, resolutions and committee recommendations. All committee recommendations were approved, and all resolutions and rule changes passed with one exception. The resolution that **failed** was:

Resolve the DSC divest from fossil fuels: By September 1, 2024, the DSC shall not knowingly make investments in any company or entity whose core business activity involves the production of coal, petroleum, or natural gas. And that the DSC requests that the Desert Southwest UMC Foundation add a similar investment screen to its holdings and investments, also by September 1, 2024.

Those that **passed** did so by a large margin. Here is the list with the results:

- Adoption of the 2025 Desert Southwest Annual Conference budget
- Resolve to foster ways in which pronouns are encouraged, and by example, all Conference staff and Conference-level staff, including the Cabinet, display their pronouns. Additionally, all events requiring registration would include an opportunity to choose pronouns and have them printed on nametags.
- Resolve to reunite the New Faith and Vital Faith Committees into one New and Vital Faith Committee.
- Created the Pasifika Islanders Commission (Task Force of Ethnic Local Church Concerns Committee)

The following rule changes were also approved

- Changed the official definition of the Conference Committee on Episcopacy
- Changed what constitutes the official bar of the Annual Conference
- Update Section IV of the Journal, which lists and defines Conference Boards, Committees, and Agencies, and match Section II of the Journal.

Related to the recent General Conference, the DSC also resolved to:

- Participate in the consultation process requesting feedback about the General Book of Discipline.
- Receive the adoption of Worldwide Regionalization by the General Conference, taking the next steps to complete the decision-making process after providing and participating in educational opportunities over the next twelve months, ensuring fully informed engagement at the 2025 Annual Conference, where ratification can be considered.

After our hard work on Friday, Saturday dawned as a day of presentations. The keynote address was presented by Dr. Ashley Boggan, General Secretary of the General Commission on Archives and History. She began by saying "sometimes we need to reach back to what we have lost in order to move forward." From this, she proceeded to relate some stories she felt we need to reclaim in order to move forward as Methodists. She called this "Wesleyan vile-tality" and defined it as "A willingness to look beyond today's acceptable practices, standards, and norms and bend the rules in order to ensure that more and more persons can be included within the Kindom and that all persons, no matter who they are, how they identify, whom they love or how they live can know and experience the love of God, can know their own self-worth, and can then grow to love themselves and others." We were surprised to hear how John Wesley moved forward in his life to do just that! (Dr. Boggan's complete talk is available for download on the DSC Annual Conference home page.). Later, we heard presentations on Immigration, and from Arizona Faith Network Heat Relief Program.

We finished the day by attending the Service of Commissioning and Ordination at Catalina UMC with Bishop Karen Oliveto preaching. Those ordained, commissioned, or received into associate membership were:

- Ordained as Elders: Sylvia Harris, Diamond Pate
- Commissioned as Provisional Elder: Lauren Coffman
- Commissioned as Provisional Deacon: Kayla Flannery Johnson
- Recognition of Orders: Rev. Chan Hong Kim

# How do I get my event in print?

As you know there are several ways events are advertised, The Good News, E-News and the Sunday insert. In addition, we have the electronic sign. There are certain criteria for each of these advertising methods. Here is an explanation of what is needed, when and how often it will appear in each publication.

Good News: The monthly newsletter is filled with upcoming events, articles of information, a monthly calendar, birthdays of persons who are 90 and over, anniversaries of couples married 50 or more years and various other articles of interest. Pictures are included when space permits. The Good News is printed and mailed at the end of the month for the upcoming month. You can also request that it be emailed if you prefer. The deadline for submitting articles is the 4th of the month prior to publication; for example articles for September newsletter is by August 4th. Articles may be submitted in writing or by email to betty@willowbrookumc.org.

E-News: This is an email that is sent out twice a week, Sunday and Thursday mornings. The E-News is designed to let you know weekly events that are happening and who will be preaching that weekend along with the sermon title and scripture. The Thursday E-News includes a "Spot of God" which is a devotional by either Laurie Lineberry or Rev. Gary. You will also find links to other Methodist Connections. To receive the ENews, you can sign up on the website or send an email to the office using the email address you want subscribed. ENews articles are also sent to bet-ty@willowbrookumc.org. The deadline for submitting information is Monday for inclusion in both publications.

Bulletin Insert: An insert is included in both the Saturday and Sunday printed bulletins. The insert includes a calendar for the upcoming week and advertising events that require a sign up to attend or are requesting items to be brought for donations, such as food. These articles only run for 2 weeks limited by space and the number of events taking place. Deadline for inserts is the Monday prior to the weekend to be included and sent to bev@willowbrookumc.org. If you need a table and sign for your event that must be included in the email. Tables should have someone there to answer questions. Saturday tables and signs are the responsibility of the group.

Electronic Sign: We are always willing to advertise on the sign but please remember the space is very limited, three short lines, the event, the date, and the time, is pretty much all that can be included. The electronic sign is advertising to the public which means anyone reading the sign may show up to the event. You must be ready to warmly include anyone that drops in at your event. Requests for items on the sign need to be sent to bev@willowbrookumc.org.

We attempt to print articles as written, but there are times that items need to be edited to, but no necessary information will be left out.

Please, if you have a question come directly to the office. We don't always have the answer, nor do we always get it right, but we try our best. It is always best to speak directly with us than to get information second- or even third-hand.
