It was years ago, beginning in 1954, that Alfred E. Neuman, the red-haired character on the cover of Mad magazine was famous for the phrase, "What, me worry?" The satirical magazine featured Alfred E. Neuman on most of its covers. That's all I know about that magazine since my parents never allowed me to actually buy a copy when I was younger. So, the cover pictures and the saying are all I know about Mad magazine. "What, me worry?" is memorable but, to most of us, not practical.

Life brings problems and concerns. There are worrisome things that we deal with all the time. But does that mean that we shouldn't ever worry? The book of Philippians 4:6-7 NRSV says, "Do not be anxious about anything, but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known to God. And the peace of God, which surpasses all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus." God has given this formula for us to deal with our worries and concerns.

I believe that the word worry means to be concerned as we deal with difficult matters. Turning to God is a way to share our worries with God and to then allow God to guide us as we deal with things. Perhaps the word that comes to mind is trust. Do we trust God to walk with us and help us? We should! I believe that God wants to share life with us and for us to grow into a trusting relationship with him. E. Stanley Jones once wrote this on the matter.

"A Portland lawyer is still practicing at ninety. His formula for living long is 'light eating and as little worrying as possible.' He remarked, 'I'm ready to go when my time comes, but in the meantime, I don't intend to worry myself into the grave.' "

Worry is a reality in life. Being overly consumed with worry is unhealthy. Being incapacitated by worry is wrong. I believe that the Philippians passage encourages us to share our worries and to trust God. Do you have a friend that you can share with, to confide in, and to pray with? Do you have a prayer chain to invite others to pray with you? Do you have a counselor, pastor, Sunday School teacher or relative who you can trust and talk to? Don't go at it alone. Trust God. Trust people God has placed in your life.

Alfred E. Neuman always seemed irresponsible to me. Trusting God always has meant to me that Jesus Christ helps bring peace of mind when dealing with the problems of life. What. me worry? Certainly not alone, I won't. Thanks be to God.

MLK on What **Really Matters**

Exactly two months before his assassination, Martin Luther King Jr. preached


his final sermon at Ebenezer Baptist Church in Atlanta. On February 4, 1968, the civil-rights icon spoke about how he wanted to be remembered at his funeral. He preferred that people recall not his education or achievements but that he "tried to give his life serving others" and "tried to love somebody."

Adapting a 1952 homily by J. Wallace Hamilton, King decried the "drum major instinct — a desire to be out front, a desire to lead the parade." Humans often want to be great and first, as evidenced by the disciples James and John requesting prime seats in paradise. But King urged listeners to focus on the "reordered priorities" of Jesus, who wants us to "be first in love."

As Jesus showed, "everybody can serve," King said. Your background or status doesn't matter, as long as you have "a heart full of grace" and "a soul generated by love."
