*What is WHEAT's Clothes Silo?

In 1985, WHEAT founded its Clothes Silo, a major program serving a vital need in our community by providing that "something extra" for women who are looking to be gainfully employed. The services provided by WHEAT's Clothes Silo help economically disadvantaged women acquire jobs, succeed in the workplace, build careers and achieve the ultimate goal of an improved quality of life for their children and fami-

Appropriate attire is essential for succeeding in an interview and acquiring a job, but most economically disadvantaged women can't afford appropriate clothing; without the clothes, they can't get a decent job. WHEAT's Clothes Silo solves this problem by providing a personal shopper to each client in our boutique, filled with women's apparel. Each client is welcomed to WHEAT's Clothes Silo by our cadre of volunteers as she prepares for a job interview that can change the course of her life. Our volunteers and staff gently guide the client through the clothing selection process, making recommendations and nurturing her self-esteem. Clients are given one complete outfit of business attire for the job interview or their first day on the job. Many women walk out the door of WHEAT's Clothes Silo on a cloud – amazed and overjoyed at their own reflection in the mirror.

WHEAT's Clothes Silo serves over 7,000 women in Arizona, annually, with a free, professional outfit. These women are referred from 123 statewide social service and job-readiness training agencies.



THE PLACE OF BURIED TREASURE: FROM THE GARDEN OF EDEN TO VENTURA, CALIFORNIA WAS THERE ONE TREE OR TWO?

For as long as I can remember, the hills above the city of my birth, Ventura, California have had two majestic trees growing high above the city, like two sentinels looking over the inhabitants below, I have always remembered them, two solitary trees standing over a beautiful city on the Pacific Ocean. It was at the base of those rolling hills where I sat and studied my assignments from Ventura College where I started my college classes. I would watch sail boats on the ocean as I sat on the lawn of the college beneath those hills with the two trees on them.

I remember standing with my father one day looking at the trees when I was a young man and he told me, almost embarrassed to share, that when he was a boy he used those trees as the focal point of a school assignment in creative writing. He shared with me that he wrote a story about pirates sailing up the California coast with treasure that they wanted to hide. They selected the base of those two trees to bury their treasure. I have remembered that ever since.

When I saw the trees recently I thought that there were the two trees as always. I found out differently. What I didn't know was that those trees were actually the last of 13 original trees planted in 1898. That was fascinating. What I found out next was sad. One tree had died and was replaced to give the appearance of the famous "two trees", and then in the Thomas fire over a year ago the last tree, which was old and struggling, was burnt by the fire and is no longer alive. I am grateful that there are still trees up on the hill but they are not the trees of my childhood. Does it make a difference? Emotionally in terms of memories and the fondness of looking at them, yes, in terms of beautiful trees, no. I do like knowing the truth.

There is another story, this one found in the Bible that proves different than our memories. Do vou recount the story of Adam and Eve? What we might remember is that Eve after being tricked by the serpent ate the apple from the forbidden tree and then gave some to Adam and he ate as well. Well, a closer reading shows that Genesis 2-4 actually reveals some important details when you actually read it and it shows that there were two trees. The tree of the knowledge of good and evil (Genesis 2:17) and also the tree of life (Genesis 3:24) are described in the story. Does it make a difference whether it is one tree or two? It sure does! There is so much more to understand by looking at what these two trees represent. The whole story of the crucifixion and resurrection has greater meaning in light of the understanding of good and evil. The whole New Testament story is richer with these details and understanding. The tree of life represents the eternal life like the promise that Jesus made to the criminal who was being crucified with him when he assured him that, "Trully I tell you, today you will be with me in Paradise." (Luke 23:43) There are so many fascinating points to the Bible. Understanding the fullness of scripture is for me like looking at the real historical trees. Don't be shortchanged by not looking at scripture in the fullness of its context and truth. So here's the plug! Please come and join us in the Pastors Academy when we look at the interesting details of the Bible and how they offer truths to us today.

Does the Bible speak truth today? It does to me! Again, come join us in Pastor's Academy after we finish our current study entitled "Nearing Home"! Studying the Bible is like sitting under a great old tree. That seems cool to me.
