

#### Eat Healthy in 2021



"How can it get any worse?" "After a very challenging 2020, it has to get better in 2021, right?" We have all heard sentences like these. We seem to place a lot of hope on our calendars, that by simply picking up a new calendar, things will get instantly better. Well we all know that a calendar year simply gives us a framework for dealing with 365 days in one block.

Can the next 365 days be better than the last 365 days? Absolutely; and here is why I believe that. We learned a lot last year. We saw a lot of human nature at its best in spite of some pretty terrible circumstances. Christians learned how to be the church without going to church. Our church family learned early on in the shutdown to be the voice of God with neighbors, family and friends. We have learned to share ministry through video, YouTube, the webpage and through good old-fashioned one-on-one conversation.

A recent survey organization published that 2 out of 5 Christians were willing to share their church's online worship services with a friend. Some of these folks might not have ever invited someone to a church building but have been willing to do some one-on-one, person-to-person outreach. The church is stronger than ever. Through social media many of our folks have invited family members across the country to worship with us on Sundays. Why? HELP US HELP OTHERS CONTREMS Each month throughout the pandemic, our church has continued our tradition of holding a food drive the first weekend of the month. For those who may not be familiar, all food donations are given to the Salvation Army and monetary donations are given to Valley View Community Food Bank.

Jesse Ramirez, founder of Valley View Food Bank recently wrote:

"Thank you –Thank you –Thank you for your support of the Valley View Community Food Bank, we are so appreciative of you!

"Your support continues to help feed "food insecure" people in our community in this scary unstable time in history, in which we are all living through, and are all affected by it in some way."

"As you continue to support us, as a team, we continue to give people hope. Hope that we all care about them."



This past January, Willowbrook held our first ever "Pillow Drive". Our goal was to donate pillows to homeless veterans throughout the year as the vets were placed into permanent housing. The outpouring of support for this program exceeded our expectations. Not

only did we receive hundreds of pillows, we also received monetary donations. This gave us the opportunity to provide additional items to the vets throughout the year; items like, drinking glasses, toasters, cutting boards and silver wear. All of your gifts are so appreciated. On behalf of the Outreach Committee, we wish to again thank you for participating in the Pillow Drive. St. Mary On December 3<sup>rd</sup>, I participated in a telephone "zoom" meeting held by the CEO of St Mary's Food Bank. This is

the 4<sup>th</sup> zoom meeting I have participated in—I learn so much with each meeting. Here are just some of the highlights:

- St Mary keeps about 22% of what they receive. The other 78% goes to local and regional food banks, agencies, and other outreach programs like Andre House. All agencies/ food banks receive donations free of charge.
- St. Mary's has a home delivery service for home bound seniors. Currently they service 12,000 households. Deliveries are completed by St. Mary employees.
- The requirements to receive assistance is set by DES (Dept. of Economic Security).
- The 3 days before Thanksgiving, St Mary's distributed 11,000 food boxes. Each food box had 100 pounds of food.
- St. Mary needs volunteers. Volunteers need to register in advance in order to keep social distancing.
- They distribute "overnight" bags to the homeless. The bags contain food that can be consumed immediately—sandwiches, fruit, food in pop-top cans.
- They continue to service the Navajo Nation. There are 57 chapter houses on the reservation. Prior to the pandemic, St. Mary's only had relationships with 14 of those chapters. Now they service 53 of those chapters. This was the first Thanksgiving St. Mary's was able to supply turkeys to the reservation.
- There will be drop off locations during citrus season (January-March). They still will be gleaning fruit on the west side.
- Each year, on the First Tuesday of December, Barro's Pizza donates 100% of their proceeds (not profits) to St. Mary's. This year Barro's donated \$330,000 from their first Tuesday event. Something to remember the next time you order a pizza.




