AVOIDING SCAMS:

One of the current SCAMS is the Advance Fee Fraud.

What happens is you are contacted by an imposter who may claim to be from a legitimate organization (like a financial institution or a fictitious government agency) offering money, products, services or something of value to you. Before you can access the cash or item you are asked to pay an upfront fee which will supposedly be refunded to you. When you pay they swiftly disappear with your money and without a trace. They may also continue to request fees after the first one.



Reservations must be made for these services by calling the church office starting March 15 (no e-mail reservations) and reserving a seat at either of the services. We will still have our video Easter service on E-News also for those of you who don't feel comfortable attending a live service and for those who live too far away. We have been together in Spirit throughout this pandemic and we will continue to be. I ask you to keep watch through E-News or by calling the church for updates on other services. You will hear more about a Palm Sunday standing service, a Maundy Thursday prayer station event and of course updates on when we will be back in the Sanctuary. We will be using the Thursday morning E-News and the Sunday E-News and the Andrew Ministry as our primary means of updated communication. The Good News will be our main printed source of Good News about the church. This is a start. Praise God! Please be patient with us as our staff and committees are working hard.

Please be in prayer for your church. Ask God to show you what your part needs to be in this ministry of ours. Pray that we might discern God's focus for us and how we reach out to other people with the Good News of Jesus Christ. So, I will either see you in church soon or continue to be seen and heard by you in your homes on your computers or televisions. May God bless us all!

MEALS ON WHEELS

Meals on Wheels can provide up to two meals per day, seven davs a week @ \$8.50 per day. With each delivery, individuals receive a lunch and, often, a meal for dinner. Frozen meals can also be delivered for a weekend meal. Meals on Wheels is a win-win scenario for local taxpayers and seniors in need of assistance. Those aged 60 years and older are eligible to receive Meals on Wheels. Those younger than 60 but homebound and unable to provide nutritious meals for themselves also qualify for the program. Caregivers and spouses of recipients are also eligible.

Sun City Meals on Wheels was founded in 1972 by two women who served about 10 clients. After establishing a delivery system, it was decided the organization would be an independent entity with no connections to either government or the National Meals on Wheels organization, so that we could establish our own procedures and guidelines. Our first home, Boswell HospitaL

Paying it back — and forward

During the pandemic, acts of kindness seemed especially meaningful. Last spring, as Covid-19 hit Native American communities particularly hard, an interesting transatlantic outreach occurred. Donations from Ireland began appearing in a relief fund for Navajo and Hopi families, leading administrators to suspect the account had been hacked. Then they realized a crossgenerational payback was underway.

In 1847, Choctaw Tribe members sent \$170 overseas to Ireland to help with Potato Famine relief. That generosity was never forgotten, and by May 2020, people in Ireland had contributed more than \$4 million toward pandemic assistance for relatives of people who'd helped their ancestors. Many donors included an Irish proverb meaning "In each other's shadows the people live."

The concept of paying it forward dates back to a 1784 letter by Benjamin Franklin. It also echoes Jesus' Golden Rule: "Do to others as you would have them do to you" (Luke 6:31). How might you live out this practice today?

DMETHODIST The United Methodist Women will meet via zoom March 15 at 12 noon. Enjoy your lunch while you



While it is still not safe for our weekly GriefShare meetings we want you to know there are still resources available to help you through your grief.


